The Year of Simple Acts of Kindness.

Upon reflection of 2020, we are reminded of many who lost family members, colleagues, friends, jobs, homes and livelihoods. Yet, we are reminded of how many people rallied together to help and serve others even though they themselves needed help. We are reminded of simple acts of kindness that helped many through the storm that caught us unawares. RDSP experienced its own losses and we are reminded of what we had to let go of: our 'new' office space, sadly saying goodbye to three of our longstanding staff members, saying a final farewell to a true development pioneer in the Northern Cape, Quinta Titus (NAMKO) and Vincent Neussl, Misereor Country Officer. Although challenged by resources,

RDSP has achieved much more than expected, although far less than was planned. With the country being under some level of lockdown for most of the year, we had to think creatively in order to serve the most vulnerable in the rural areas where we work.

Participants were trained to present the different information talks using the methodologies and resource packs. It also equips participants with basic facilitation skills to enable them to present the information talks more confidently.


Most participants indicated that they had implemented the information with their closest relatives and friends who were experiencing addiction problems. They shared that they were comfortable sharing this information with people they trust.

Rural COVID-19 Relief Project



The Misereor Emergency Covid-Relief Fund enabled us to reach out to the rural Western, Eastern and Northern Cape in partnership with our local community based organisation network. From June to August 2020 food parcels/ food vouchers, hand sanitizers, face soap and face masks were distributed amongst vulnerable community members. 26 Local women produced face masks and earned an income. A rural ECD centre received food parcels and face masks. 30 Face shields were provided to a preschool (Grade R) class in a rural farm school.

Local communities grateful for a hot meal each day

As the bitterly cold weather swept across the Western Cape, bringing widespread rains and snowfalls on the Ceres mountains, the communities of Bella Vista, Nduli, including Vredebes, Prince Alfred Hamlet and Ceres, are grateful for the promise of a warm meal each day.

With funding from the Perdekraal Wind Farm, local NGOs are extending their programmes and increasing their efforts as the cold spreads in the area.

"We are collaborating with four NGOs in the area that have been providing meals to five allocated communities, with the promise of offering at least one meal to 500 community members for five days over a four-week period," said Jo-Anne Brown, Economic Development Manager at Perdekraal East Wind Farm.

The project commenced on Monday 7 September. Food parcels had previously been provided in collaboration with the Department of Social Development to the most vulnerable in these communities.

Warrick Alexander and his team at Witz Events Network is responsible for implementing a programme, aptly named Feeding our Communities with Hope, which the local wind farm's funds are helping to sustain

are helping to sustain.

He explained: "With the Covid-19 infections reaching a predicted peak, many are less focused on the hungry tummies and frustrated households of communities, with grandmothers having to make a plan for when the next meal is coming from.

"So this funding is not only helping us feed our people with food, but provides hope and dignity."

Said Brown: "At the beginning of lockdown we worked with the Department of Social Development to fund food parcels to 150 households within our partner communities as well as to farms in the Karoo area, which provided meals for about a month, to more than 400 people."

Campaign to supply facemasks in Eastern Cape

In the light of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Rural Development Support Program (RDSP), an associate body of the Southern African Catholics Bishops' Conference, has started a campaign to supply families in the rural villages of the Eastern Cape with facemasks, to aid in continued efforts to check the spread of the virus.

The NPO, which serves various regions, has been working in the Eastern

gions, has been working in the Eastern Cape for over 15 years and in the past six years has been operating a satellite

office in Bhisho.

RDSP staffer Nosakhele Mpush. who knows and understands the local communities and runs the work in the province, explained that the organisation started the campaign on April 20, because it saw the need for hygiene items in neighbouring villages due to

the pandemic.

Ms Mpush has identified three vii-lages where there is a great need: Bha-lasi Location, Tyutu Location and litha Township in King William's

Town.
"The unemployment rate is very high in these villages and many people depend on the elderly and child support grant only. They live in small

houses or shacks where there are about houses or shacks where there are about five or more in one bousehold, and there are no taps in their yards for water," she explained. "Some family members have to go to public healthcare centres and col-

lect their grant payouts—places where they need to wear facemasks. When I inquired why they do not follow the instructions of wearing masks, they said they cannot afford to buy them, and access to the shops where they can buy them is difficult," Ms Mpush

A major concern is that residents could easily get the virus and spread it to their families without intending to. "500n it is going to be grant paydays, so they will be at high risk for contract-

so they will be at high risk for contracting the virus if not equipped with masks
and hand sanitisers [due to the limited
access to water]. Besides having limited
food during this Covid-19 pandemic,
they have the added burden of keeping
themselves and their families safe and
protected," she noted.

Nonsthetho Kwinana, 49, who was
born and bred in the rural areas of
Keiskammahoek where she is currently
based, makes the cloth facemasks with
the help of ber neighbour. She charges
R20 per mask.

"Due to unemployment and unfore-

seen circumstance, in 2001 I started to make use of the skill that I have as a seamstress to put food on the table. Now I am sewing facemasks due to this Covid-19 pandemic," Ms Kwinana said. She explained that the masks she makes as afte.

Covid-19 parademic," Ms Kwinana said. She explained that the masks she maskes are safe because they comprise three layers to ensure the virus cannot be spread easily.

"This project helps me in making sure we are living in a protected community. This pandemic has caused distress to self-employed people like myself; now at least I get to use my skills and keep myself busy by making facemasks," Ms Kwinana said.

To date, the RDSP has raised RS 600, which means that they will be able to supply 430 people with masks. It hopes to reach many more rural people through this initiative.

The organisation would also like to supply communities with hand sanitisers, and asks for donations for these as well.

Gift-a-Granny Campaign...



The Gift-a-Granny campaign was initiated by 88 year old Margaret Pothier in early May 2020 when the effects of the Coronavirus lockdown were really starting to be felt. Margaret explained:

"I was always taught to help others and the thought of people going hungry during this COVID-19 pandemic keeps me awake at night. It is always the elderly and children who bear the brunt of a crisis such as coronavirus. No child should go to bed hungry. I want to help in particular older women, who have arthritis like me, and who need food to take their pain medication".

Margaret set about making peanut butter sandwiches and hardboiled eggs to be distributed by non-profit organisations that work in her local township, Masiphumelele, and amongst poor communities. Through a Back-a-Buddy fundraising campaign, Margaret soon raised a staggering R36 498. Because Margaret is the mother of an RDSP board member, RDSP agreed to be the conduit for these funds as a registered NPO.

By the end of September Margaret, with some help from the rest of the family, had made an amazing 2 325 sandwiches and 1 098 hard-boiled eggs. She also added fresh fruit.









Covid-19 Impact Survey...



- Our vision and aims guide our fundraising.










16 Days of Activism – Witzenberg Justice Coalition




7 Habits of Highly Effective People Training
